What is a councillor?

A **councillor** is a person elected by people in your area to represent them on the local council.



Councillors make decisions about local services like housing, social care, and transport.



They are there to listen to your views and help with issues that matter to you.

How to find out who is your councillor and how to contact them

Go to your local council's official website.

If you are not sure what council area you live in, you can ask someone you trust for help to use this gov. uk tool: www.gov.uk/find-local-council

You'll need to know your address or post code.

Ways to contact your councillor

Email

Send them an email explaining your issues.



Letter

Write a letter and post it to their office.

In Person

Attend their **"surgery"** sessions, where you can meet them face-to-face.

A surgery is a time when some councillors meet with residents to hear what they think.



You can find out when and where these are held on your council's website.



Phone

Call them to tell them what you think.
