Why is this important?

In a local election, you **choose who represents you** on your local council.

This can help you make the **best choice for you** when you are voting.

Your local council website

- Councils publish a list of candidates in the weeks leading up to the election.

The Electoral Commission

website – In the run up to elections, you can enter your postcode on The Electoral Commission <u>website</u> to find out who the candidates in your area are.

How to find out what candidates think

Candidates share their views in different ways. You can:



Look at their website or social media - Many candidates post their views online.



Go to a local meeting or debate - Some candidates talk to people in their community.



Flyers and leaflets - Sometimes local councillors will share flyers with their views and plans.



Ask them questions – You can send an email or talk to them in person.
